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
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

curacao

Does the name Curacao make you think of that pretty blue liquor? Well, the aqua water here is prime for underwater adventures that give you a different kind of buzz. If you're jonesing for diving or snorkeling, or just discovering a hot spot before all the crowds do, Curacao's the place. After diving offshore, you'll find one-of-a-kind restaurants and shops in its candy-colored capital, Willemstad.

where to stay (*)\$


- Avila Hotel's rooms range from oceanfront in the Blue Wing to modern in the Octagon Wing (AvilaHotel.com; 800-747-8162).
- Perched on cliffs overlooking a secluded beach with a natural coral reef, Lodge Kura Hulanda & Beach Club boasts spacious rooms with balconies or patios (KuraHulanda.com; 877-264-3106).

what to do

- You finally have an excuse to use that underwater camera! Curacao has some of the best diving and snorkeling spots in the world. Highlights include a sunken tugboat and mushroom-shaped coral formations. For local dive operators, go to Curacao.com.
- Stroll around the Punda district, a configuration of pedestrianonly streets and alleys filled with brightly colored, quaint shops (between the Waterfort and Fort Amsterdam in Willemstad).
- Take an anthropology tour à deux at the Museum Kurá Hulanda. You can check out historic artifacts from Curacao and beyond (entrance ticket \$9; Klipstraat 9, Willemstad; 5999-434-7765).

drinking and dining

- Brave enough to try iguana soup at Jaanchies Restaurant? They say it's an aphrodisiac (from \$10; Westpunt; 5999-864-0126).
- Locals head to Awa Di Playa for some fresh fare (\$20 for dinner; Piscadera Bay; 5999-462-6939) and get a hearty lunch for \$8 a plate at Marsche Bieuw in Willemstad (aka the Old Market).
- On Sundays at Zanzibar Beach and Restaurant, DJs spin funk and R&B. Then grab yourself the ice-cold cocktail-of-the-day for just \$5 (Zanzibar-Curacao.com/eng; 5999-747-0633). >



where to stay (**)\$

- After spending a couple of days relaxing in Bucuti Beach Resort's modern, airy rooms and beachfront (and kid-free!) pool, you'll be addicted. Cool fact: The resort fosters sea turtle preservation right on its grounds (Bucuti.com; 297-583-1100).
- One of the island's best-kept secrets, Amsterdam Manor Beach Resort's charming Dutch colonial-style architecture wraps around a spotless pool and the gorgeous beach is just a quick stroll away (AmsterdamManor.com; 800-969-2310).

what to do

- On Red Sail Sport's Antilla Snorkel Sail, see the famous shipwreck and Catalina Bay; for \$49 per person, you'll get drinks, snacks, instruction and equipment (RedSailAruba.com; 877-733-7245).
- Hike, walk or bike through divi-divi trees, cactus gardens, sand dunes and even caves for free at Arikok National Park.

Craving some culture? Check out the folklore dancing on Tuesday night at the Bon Bini Festival, where local Aruban dancers strut their stuff in traditional costumes from 6:30 to 9 p.m. in downtown Oranjestad (\$3 entry fee; Fort Zoutman inner courtyard).

drinking and dining

- At Pinchos Grill & Bar on the Surfside Marina, every table is on the water's edge, making it a hot spot for sunset dinner (entrées from \$19; Interreps.nl/pinchos.htm; 297-583-2666).
- Go to Charlie's Bar & Restaurant for a tasty lunch and collection of tchotchkes left behind by people from around the world. Try the spicy honeymoon sauce and, for a laugh, ask what the "hoere hap" seafood special is (from \$7; San Nicolas; 297-584-5086).
- Hunt for souvenirs in town; then kick back with a locally brewed Balashi beer for \$3.50 at Salt & Pepper. Bring a set of shakers and they'll swap you a free glass of wine (SaltandPepperAruba.com)!



barbados

If you really love the beach but crave too much action to simply sit round sunbathing, try Barbados. You can head to the island's wild der-the-radar surf spots, zip around on exciting



- On Barbados' beautiful west coast, head to the Almond Beach Club & Spa, an adults-only, all-inclusive hotel. Make sure to dive into their freshwater swimming pool and book a spa treatment (your credit's on page 90!; AlmondResorts.com; 800-425-6663).
- Overlooking a gully, the hilltop boutique resort Sugar Cane Club Hotel and Spa has a cool Mediterranean vibe with drop-dead ocean views and free hourly shuttles to the beach.

- At historic St. Nicholas Abbey, finish your \$15 tour of this historic Barbados home with a free glass of spiked punch in the afternoon (StNicholasAbbey.com; 246-422-5357).
- Surf the Soup Bowl, frequented by professionals like Kelly Slater. Learn the basics of riding the waves with Zed Layson, a fifthgeneration Barbadian and competitive surfer. Show Zed this article and get a two-hour lesson for \$60 each, which is regularly \$80 per person (ZedsSurfTravel.com; 246-428-7873)!

Go behind the scenes on the island's dramatic east coast on an offroad Jeep safari-with a requisite rum-punch stop (half-day tours from \$50 per person; IslandSafari.bb; 246-429-5337).

- Spend Friday or Saturday night in Oistins, a fish fry that bustles with specialties like grilled fish and macaroni pie that cost around \$10 for a huge plate. Among the open-air stalls that line the main street, ask for Uncle Georges and be sure to eat there—you have to try the grilled marlin (Christ Church Parish).
- For a classic summer drink made just right, head to John Moore Bar for one of the island's most authentic rum-guzzling destinations. Order up a couple of their refreshing rum 'n' Cokes for just \$2.50 each (Weston, St. James Parish; 246-422-2258).
- Cool down with a couple of beers for just \$2 a pop at Fisherman's Pub & Beach Bar in Speightstown, but for real island flavor and Calypso music, head there on Wednesdays for dinner and dancing at \$18 per person (St. Peter; 246-422-2703). >



nevis

Hilly Nevis is a great escape for hikers and outdoor sports buffs-or anyone looking for quiet and nature. Hike through rainforests, bike or take a mountaintop horseback ride. Nevis has a laid-back vibe, but locals still like to have fun. You can experience the island's spirit at unpretentious beach bars and its lively annual Culturama Festival.

where to stay (*)\$



A former eighteenth-century sugar estate turned flower-draped hotel with pretty pastel cottages in the Nevis hills, Golden Rock Inn is a favorite stomping ground for savvy travelers. Don't miss their afternoon tea on the porch (Golden-Rock.com; 869-469-3346).

what to do

- Get down at the annual Culturama Festival (July 24 through August 4). It packs in 12 days of Nevisian food, music, performances and parades (special events from \$5; NevisCulturama.net).
- The Hermitage Plantation Inn's equestrian center offers guided horseback rides through local villages and Saddle Hill for \$40 each for readers of The Nest (regularly \$55). Enjoy the island's clearest views (HermitageNevis.com; 800-682-4025).

Burn off a leisurely lunch together by renting a couple of mountain bikes for \$25 a day per person at Windsurf'N'Mountainbike Nevis. Bonus: You'll get 15 percent off advanced bookings by mentioning The Nest (BikeNevis.com; 869-469-9682)!

drinking and dining

- Bring your appetites to The Water Department Barbecue from 4 to 9 p.m. on Fridays. This spot is known for barbecue specialties and chicken that people always line up for. This stick-to-your-ribs meal will only set you back \$3 to \$10 (Pump Road, Charlestown).
- In the bright dining room of Rodney's Cuisine, owner Rodney Elliott serves up homemade West Indian dishes that all cost about 15 bucks or less, like their famous "cook-up," which is a mix of peas and rice, chicken and salt fish. Be sure to order a Mauby, a local drink (near Charlestown; 869-663-1644).
- Get "stung" by Sunshine's signature rum punch called Killer Bee for \$5—the spot is a local legend for barbecue and dancing by the beach (Pinney's Beach; SunshineNevis.com; 869-469-5817).

trinidad&tobac

Sneak kisses on the sand and don't bother getting dressed up for dinner on Tobago, the prettier of the two islands. Prized for its secluded beaches (one is even called Lovers' Beach!), the island's quiet vibe sets the mood for romance.

where to stay (7)\$)

- You'll feel like a VIP at the Bacolet Beach Club, a small and sexy Tobago boutique hotel. Rooms have canopy beds with white gauze drapes, and the infinity pool is a perfect spot to enjoy the view of their bar (BacoletBeachClub.com; 868-639-2357).
- Surrounded by palms, bamboo and bougainvillea, Half Moon Blue Hotel has open verandas and chaise lounges that set the mood for chillin'. Its loft-like interiors have luxurious linens in crisp blues (HalfMoonBlue.com; 868-639-3551).

what to do

- Get access to tons of bright and beautiful fish in **Speyside**, a small fishing village with access to great snorkeling for \$25 per person (TobagoDiveExperience.com; 868-660-4888).
- Go on an adventure in **Tobago's Little Amazon**, the oldest protected rainforest in the Western Hemisphere (\$65 per person-Nesties will score 10 percent off; TobagoNow.com; 868-639-1476).

■ Tee off at the award-winning 18-hole Mount Irvine Bay Golf Course. The course is known for its standout views of the Caribbean Sea from every hole (green fees from \$30; Mtlrvine.com).

drinking and dining

- Belly up to a table at the Kariwak Village Restaurant, where the thatch roofs, clay-tiled floors and rattan furniture are rustic-chic and the super-tasty Caribbean and Creole fare is the real deal (\$33 prix fixe per person; Kariwak.com; 868-639-8442).
- Six huts with no-nonsense names like Alma's Local Food and Sylvia's Food Shop are located on the main dining strip in Crown Point, selling delicious Tobagonian dishes, like crab and dumplings, for about \$7. For cheap beers, head to Bonkers (Alma's: Store Bay Beach Facilities, 868-639-7573; Bonkers: Store Bay Local Road, 868-639-7173).
- Café Coco serves up local dishes and flavors from around the islands, including Cuba, Martinique and Jamaica. If you're up for (entrees from \$15; CocoReef.com/cafecoco; 868-639-0996)! [n]
